Before Service:

Fred's occupation on enlistment for WW1 is shown as a Farm Labourer.

During Service in WW1:

His Height was recorded as 5'3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" Chest 35", Light Brown Hair, Hazel Eyes and a Fresh Complexion. He was attached as follows: HMS Pembroke II (Chatham) on 31/7/1917 – 27/10/1917 as a Stoker II, HMS Conquest 28/10/1917 – 13/7/1918, promoted to Stoker I 8/3/1918, HMS Pembroke II 14/7/1918 – 9/8/1918 and finally HMS Dragon 10/8/1918 – 15/3/1919.

He was commended for "Good Service" on the occasion of the mining of HMS Conquest on the 15<sup>th</sup> June 1918.



HMS Dragon was a D class cruiser and was launched in Glasgow, in December 1917.

She was scuttled in July 1944 off the Normandy beaches as part of the Arromanches Breakwater.



HMS Conquest was commissioned into service in the Royal Navy in June 1915.

After Service in WW1:

After WW1 Fred worked as a thatcher, hedger and shepherd. Just prior to WW2 he worked for the Palmer family at Parsonage Farm, North Elham and lived in a tied cottage. The property was divided into two farm workers cottages, Fred and his family of 10 lived in the one on the left hand side.

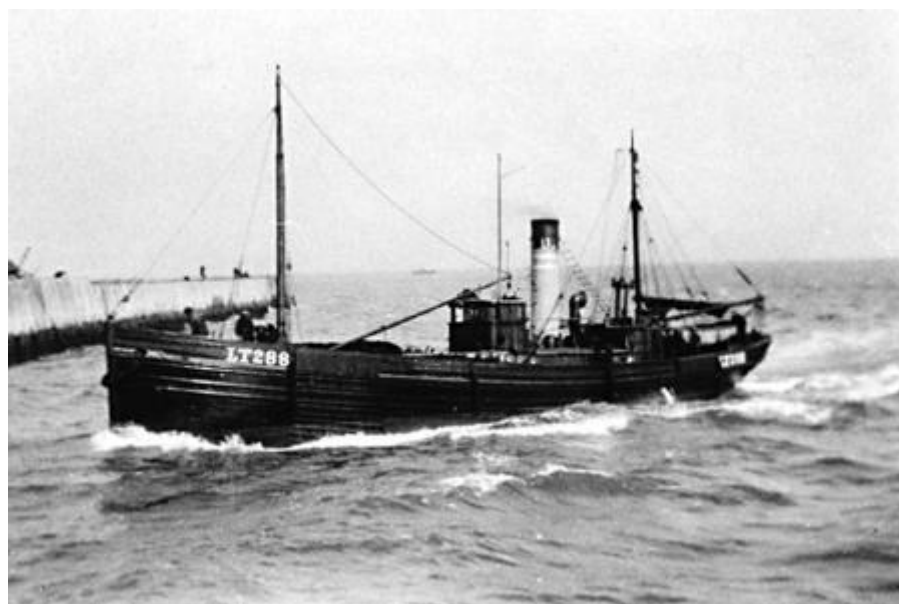
During Service in WW2:

At the outbreak of the WW2, although he was 48, Fred left his protected employment as a shepherd and re-en listed. As his previous home was a tied cottage the family moved to No.4 Cherry Gardens.



Fred outside 4, Cherry Gardens

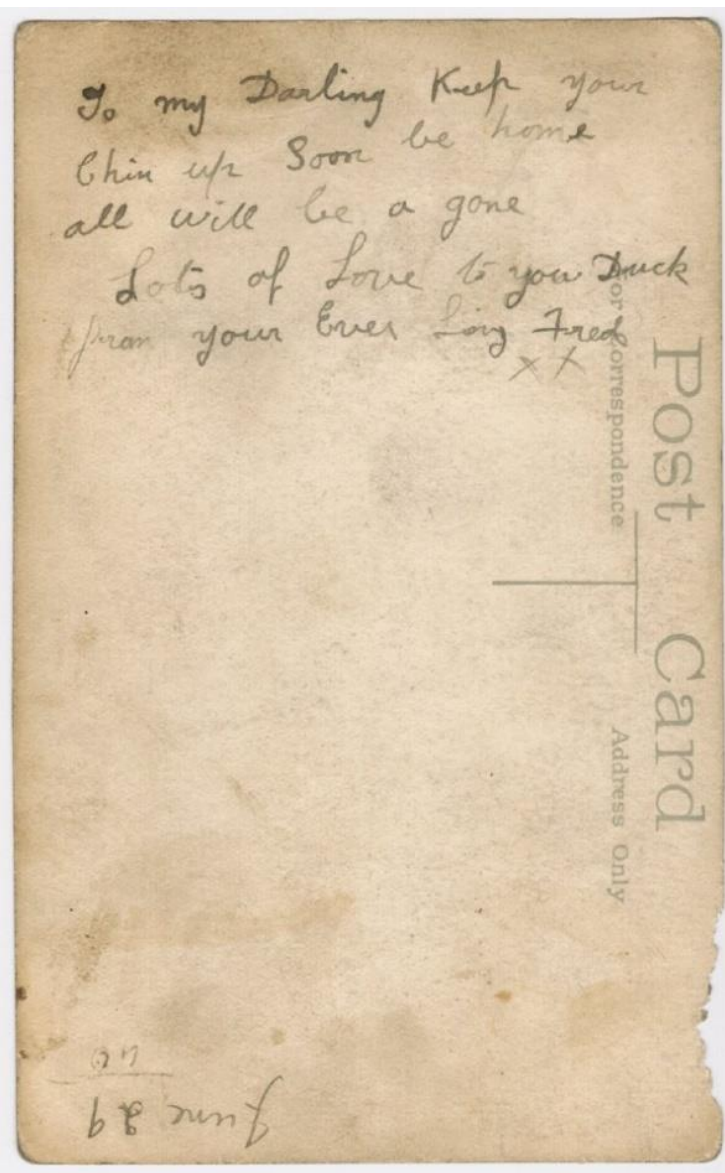
Fred served on H.M.Drifter Receptive which was engaged in mine sweeping operations in coastal waters.

It is believed that on the 1<sup>st</sup> July 1941 the Luftwaffe dropped acoustic mines in the Thames Estuary and on 3rd July 1941 tragedy struck when Fred's vessel hit a mine off the Isle of Sheppy with the loss of all crew.
